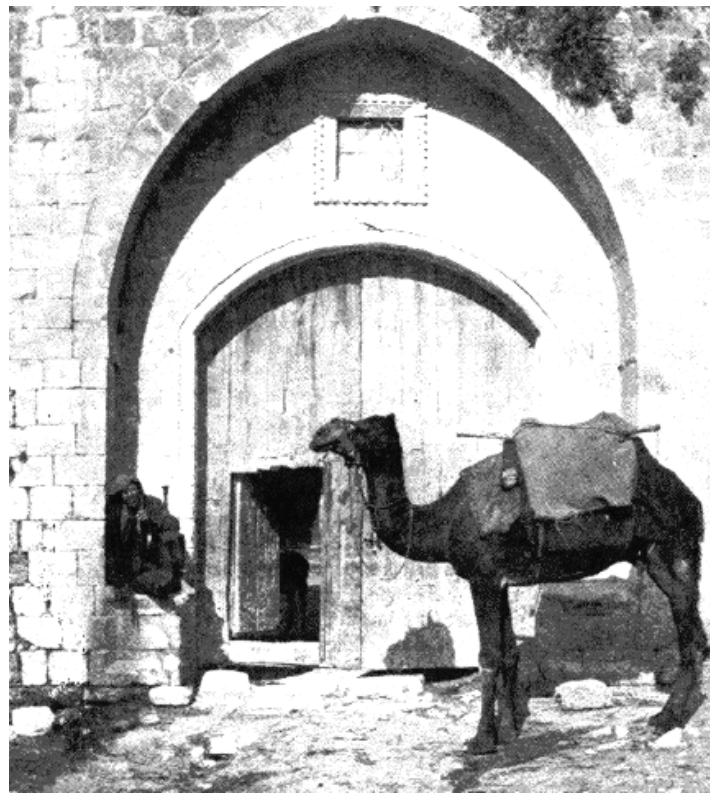

Please be seated
